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PURPOSE:

This program uses the Bahá'i writings to develop the virtues and noble qualities latent within all children. Children will familiarize themselves with quotations, explore the meaning of each virtue and understand the importance of their individual spiritual development and progress.

FORMAT:

Duration: A program for one year with a lesson each week.

Terms: Each term begins with two lessons on the topic of either Our Purpose, The Spirit Within, Prayer or Deeds not Words. This is then followed by lessons based on the virtues, each of which are covered over two weeks. The order of the virtues does not matter, however the topics that begin each term are best done in the order in which they are presented..

CONTENT:

Scenarios: The purpose of these scenarios is to introduce children to the virtue and the quotation. It is designed to encourage children to look at life situations and understand that we always have a choice as to how we deal with them. The virtues are described as the tools to fix the problems or difficulties we have when faced with these choices.

Quote Visualizations: These are used to help the children become familiar with and to try to memorize the quotation. It helps in the discussion of what the meaning is of the whole quote and also specific words. Ask the children to say each part of the quotation with you. Go over it several times. The children, by the end of the two weeks should be able to say the quotation using only the pictures or even better, they will have memorized it completely. The purpose is to internalize the quotation rather than memorize although it is wonderful if they can say it by themselves. In other words, they will become familiar with the words and understand the meaning.

To help memorization other activities can be implemented including:

- covering up one picture and then another until they can say the whole thing without any pictures or words.
- after they have cut the pictures out, see if the children can put them back into order from memory.

Discussions: The discussion prompt sheet provided allows the children to have a simple visual focus while learning what the virtue means. You can also compare and contrast the virtue with the opposite or lack of the virtue to make the meaning very clear to the children. For example, you could ask the question; What might we say if we are not being 'thoughtful' of others? Other books which describe the virtues in more detail may be beneficial for the development of your own understanding before the class starts.

Stories: Each story relates to the virtue or quotation being discussed and finishes with a moral which can either be read out or discussed informally with the class.

Songs: Children usually respond well when you teach them some actions to the words of the songs.

Prayers: Always ask the children to be reverent and wait for them to be sitting reverently before starting the prayer. Once children are familiar with a prayer you could ask if any of them would like to say it on their own.

Games: The games are designed to give the children a more complete understanding of the virtue or quotation being discussed.

HINTS:

Materials: <u>Double-sided sticky</u> tape can be used instead of glue. It can be bought from most craft shops. It can be stuck on before the lesson, does not take drying time and is very strong. Otherwise use glue sticks, Clag glue or PVA.

<u>Crayons</u> are often preferable to textas for young children as they cover areas more quickly and easily. They also are less likely to cover up line work such as quotations.

Shops like Spotlight have craft material such as plastic eyes, magnets, etc... If specific materials like plastic eyes are not easily available they could be made out of paper, drawn on or the activity could be adapted to make it more practical.

Preparation: Depending on the size and age of the class, it may be beneficial to do some cutting and preparing of activities before class to help with lesson flow and assist those children who may take a long time to complete some tasks.


Before class make a sample of each activity so that children can see what they will be making.


It is advisable to always make an extra one or two spares for the activities in case of mistakes or extra students.



LESSON PLAN

DAY 1

DISCUSSION: Who is God? God is everywhere although we can't see Him with our eyes. He is always there to help us and protect us.

Why did God create us? God created us to make this world a better place. Sometimes people get sad and angry and need a way to change this so that they can be happy again. To do this God has given us many tools like kindness, love, respect and generosity. These tools are gifts from God to each one of us. We just need to learn how to use them properly so we can make the 'best' choices.

Make up the toolbox described in the beginning of the book and put some virtues inside it. (Do this before class). Show it to the children to demonstrate the above discussion.

PRAYER: God never leaves us alone. He will always be there for us when we need Him and we can ask him for help by saying prayers because prayer is our way of talking to God. God doesn't always help us in the way we expect him to but he will always be there to assist us in making the right choices.

Read out the prayer "Say: O God, my God!"

Use the illustrated prayer provided to discuss the meaning of the prayer. Also briefly explain the meaning of difficult words such as 'attire' and 'temple'.

Justice is one of the tools or gifts God gives us, can you think of some other ones?

SONG: "Say: O God, my God!" Sing with actions.

ACTIVITY: A Gift – Use activity sheet provided – children can put the gift box in their room to remind them of the gifts God gives us to deal with every difficult situation we have to face. Purpose – To reflect on the meaning of the prayer and understand that the gifts God gives us help us in every situation.

REVIEW:

Ask the children to colour in the black and white prayer so they have a copy to take home.

DAY 2

PRAYER: "Say: O God, my God!" Sing with actions.

DISCUSSION: What does God want us to do?

God wants us to change every situation into a happy one. He gives us the tools of love, friendship etc... to do this. We can pray to him, we can ask him for assistance and he will guide us and help us make the right choices.

LESSON PLAN

DAY 1

DISCUSSION: Discuss how prayer is our way of talking to God. We can ask for assistance when we need help, thank him for the wonderful things he has already given us and ask for guidance when we feel unsure. God doesn't always help us the way we expect him to. Ask the children what they think they might like to talk to God about.

Read out the prayer "He is God! O God my God"

Use the illustrated prayer provided to discuss the meaning of the prayer.

We need to strive to make our heart pure. Use a glass of water to show that when the water is clean the sun can shine through it but when we put some dust in it the sun cannot. Our heart is the same. When we fill ourselves with nasty thoughts it is like we are making our heart dirty and God cannot shine through us any more. When God does shine through us we become strong inside. We become confident, joyful, loving, respectful.

SONG: "He is God! O God my God"

Sing with actions.

ACTIVITY: Pure Hearts – Use activity sheet provided.

Purpose - to visualize what it means to have a pure heart and let God shine through us.

REVIEW:

Ask the children to colour in the black and white prayer so they have a copy to take home.

DAY 2

PRAYER: "He is God! O God my God"

Sing with actions.

DISCUSSION: Where does love, kindness, respect etc... come from?

Use a small mirror and a torch to show how God has given us the ability to reflect God's qualities just like a mirror reflects the light of a torch or the sun. These virtues do not belong to us just like the light does not belong to the mirror, but we can still carry the virtues with us wherever we go. However, if we stop thinking about God or trying to develop our spiritual qualities it is as if we have turned away from the light and those qualities that make us special will no longer be reflected in our hearts.



"What can I do?" Myrtle mirror would sigh. "I only reflect people, I will never actually be a person. It's not fair."



middle," he said and knocked down the centre of his friend's castle so that he could put his there. "Hey," said his friends but Ryan didn't listen.



SESSION 1

PRAYER: Sing prayers that have been learnt and any others that the children know. Ask them to be reverent because they are talking to God.

SCENARIO:

Read out the scenario, on the next page, to the children.

Use the Happy / Sad Face (as described in the beginning of the book) to discuss what could turn the situation around from a sad one to a happy one. Let the child who comes up with the solution first, turn the mouth from a gloomy face to a smiling one.

Bring out the toolbox (as described in the beginning of the book) and let the children guess which tool (virtue) they could use to fix the situation. Remind the children that these are the tools God gives us to help us in everything we do each day. Choose one child to take out the tool. Read out the virtue and the quotation. Ask the children to say the quotation with you a couple of times. Discuss what the quotation means

Discussion Thoughts - Being giving and generous are qualities of God and they should be qualities of ours too.

SONG: "Give it Away" - sing with actions.

ACTIVITY: Make Special Gifts – Use activity sheet provided.

Purpose – to reflect on the quotation – to practice being generous.

SESSION 2

PRAYER: Sing prayers that have been learnt and any others that the children know. Ask them to be reverent because they are talking to God.

DISCUSSION REVIEW: What does generosity mean?

Optional - Use discussion prompts sheet from the beginning of the book to help with the discussion.

SONG: "Give it Away" - sing with actions.

STORY: "Isobella Learns to Share"

GAME: Play a game based on the traditional 'Pass the Parcel' Instead of the person who receives the parcel when the music stops opening it up, they are responsible for giving it to the next person. The person who wins the prize at the end and takes off the last layer of wrapping paper must show generosity by sharing the prize with everyone else in the group. (Make sure the prize is something that can be easily shared around.)

Purpose – To practice the act of giving.

ACTIVITY:

Use the quote visualization page to review the meaning of the quotation.

Say the quotation with the children a few times. Older children may be able to memorize it. Give each child a copy of the quotation activity provided. Cut and glue in each part of the quotation in the correct order, colour in and assist the child to write in something that they can do to practice generosity.


"We do like lollies but we don't have any." replied Larn and the two boys started walking away.

We worked together, we knew you were hungry.


The wolf pushed, and the wolf pulled but no matter how much he tried


"Excuse me," said the voice,


Pop was not interested and went back to soaking up the sun, ignoring the protests from the little sunflower plant.




GENTLE GINGER

GAME: Play an assertiveness game called Stand Up, Sit Down. Read out the situations provided one at a time and ask the children to decide whether the situation is a time to be assertive or accepting. If they think they should be assertive then the child should stand up. If they think the answer is acceptance then they should sit down.

Purpose – to reflect on what assertiveness means – to understand that assertiveness means standing up for what you believe in.

ACTIVITY:


THE BIG SHIP

SCENARIO:

Read out the scenario on the next page to the children.

Use the Happy / Sad Face (as described in the beginning of the book) to discuss what could turn the situation around from a sad one to a happy one. Let the child who comes up with the solution first turn the mouth from a gloomy face to a smiling one.

Bring out the toolbox (as described in the beginning of the book) and let the children guess which tool (virtue) they could use to fix the situation. Remind the children that these are the tools God gives us to help us in everything we do each day. Choose one child to take out the tool. Read out the virtue and the quotation. Ask the children to say the quotation with you a couple of times. Discuss what the quotation means

"...show forth love and affection, wisdom and compassion, faithfulness and unity towards all, without any discrimination."

Discussion Thoughts - When we see that someone needs help in some way, we don't just walk away. Even if someone is dirty or doesn't speak the same language as us or is not always kind to us we should still be compassionate, loving and kind towards them.

SONG: "Be a Friend" - sing with actions.

ACTIVITY: Compassionate Person – Use activity sheet provided.

Purpose – to visualize the quotation.

SESSION 2

PRAYER: Sing prayers that have been learnt and any others that the children know. Ask them to be reverent because they are talking to God.

DISCUSSION REVIEW: What does compassion mean?

Optional - Use discussion prompts sheet from the beginning of the book to help with the discussion.

SONG: "Be a Friend" - sing with actions.

STORY: "The Sun and the Rain"

GAME: Ask for one volunteer at a time to demonstrate the virtue of compassion through some role plays. Ask the first volunteer to pretend to have been hurt from falling off their bike. Ask the second volunteer to pretend to be very sorry for breaking their friend's special toy. Ask the third volunteer to pretend to be a new person at school sitting by themselves because they don't know any of the other children. After each role play ask other children in the class to show how they could be compassionate in that situation.

Purpose – To reflect on what it means to be compassionate.

ACTIVITY:

Use the quote visualization page to review the meaning of the quotation.

Say the quotation with the children a few times. Older children may be able to memorize it. Give each child a copy of the quotation activity provided. Cut and glue in each part of the quotation in the correct order, colour in and assist the child to write in something that they can do to practice compassion.























STORY

while the sun said, "If you gave just a little water to each garden in the town like you did to this one it would become very beautiful instead of muddy and dirty like it is now."




